

The PROTECT Act

The PROTECT Act was signed into law on August 5, 2026. It strengthens protections for Massachusetts residents by limiting state and local participation in federal civil immigration enforcement and creating new safeguards in schools, child care facilities, health care settings, courthouses, and other state and local institutions.

Courthouses • Prohibits civil immigration arrests inside courthouses and on courthouse grounds, including parking lots, without a judicial warrant.	Nov. 3, 2026
Child Care Facilities • Prohibits civil immigration arrests at licensed child care centers, family child care homes, child care programs, and group care facilities without a judicial warrant or order. • Requires statewide policies and training on interactions with ICE.	Sept. 1, 2026
Public & Charter Schools • Prohibits civil immigration arrests on school grounds without a judicial warrant. • Requires DESE to develop guidance, model policies, and training.	Sept. 1, 2026
Health Care • Prohibits civil immigration arrests without a judicial warrant in nonpublic areas of covered health care and group care facilities, including certain nursing homes. • Requires covered facilities to adopt policies for responding to civil immigration enforcement.	Oct. 4, 2026

STANDBY GUARDIANSHIP

Aug. 5, 2026

- Allows parents and legal guardians to plan ahead by arranging for someone to care for their children if they are detained or deported.

LIMITING STATE AND LOCAL INVOLVEMENT IN IMMIGRATION ENFORCEMENT

Sept. 4, 2026

The PROTECT Act establishes important limits on state and local participation in federal civil immigration enforcement:

- Police, sheriffs, and courts generally **cannot ask** about or record a person's **immigration status**, with limited exceptions for certain criminal investigations or when required by law.
- State and local **resources** generally **cannot be used** for federal civil immigration enforcement.
- Police, sheriffs, and courts are limited from sharing **nonpublic information** with ICE. ICE requests must generally be in writing, identify a specific person, and have been received within the prior 30 days.
- Police, sheriffs, and courts generally cannot stop, arrest, search, investigate, or detain someone for federal civil immigration enforcement purposes.
- People cannot be detained solely based on an **ICE detainer** (a request from ICE to hold someone for immigration purposes).
- Generally **prohibits** new or expanded **287(g) agreements**, which allow state and local law enforcement to perform certain federal immigration enforcement functions.
- Cities and towns may adopt **stronger protections**.

PROTECTIONS FOR PEOPLE IN DETENTION

Nov. 3, 2026

- Requires state and county detention facilities to provide **free, regular, and reasonable video access for legal consultations**.
- Strengthens requirements for transportation or remote access for court proceedings.
- Requires facilities to document compliance and notify attorneys when hearings or appointments are missed or rescheduled due to the facility.
